He satisfied the wrath and justice of the Father, who then raised His Son from death to life, that we might live now and eternally.

#### **Cardboard testimonies**

Churches across America are starting a new trend in sharing faith stories. Christians are using cardboard signs to concisely but powerfully share how God has changed their lives.

In 2008, Hillside Christian Church in Amarillo, Texas, posted a video titled "Cardboard Testimonies" on YouTube. Since then, it's been viewed more than 2 million times.

In the video, people from all walks of life take turns announcing silently, via their signs, how God has transformed sin, brokenness and doubt into forgiveness, healing and faith. First, they hold up the side of their sign that tells what their life had been like. Then they turn it over to reveal how God has made a difference.

Cardboard testimonies are a mighty reminder that God restores lives. As Paul says in 2 Corinthians 5:17 (NRSV), "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"



#### **SYNODICAL CONVENTION REPORT**

Mr. Ron Hoehnke was the Lay-delegate from our Western Circuit. He is a member of St. John Lutheran Church, Cudahy, WI. This report appeared in the newsletter of St. John's.

### A Lay Delegate's Week In Houston

What an honor to have been chosen as the Lay Delegate representing the Western Circuit of the SELC District at the National Convention of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. It was a week filled with devotions and high emotions.

Our first full day in Houston, Saturday, July 10 started with a meeting to familiarize all voters with the voting machines and procedures that would be used during the week.

The opening Service was held that afternoon. If you ever get a chance to hear close to 700 Pastors at one service, along with as many or more lay persons, an adult and a children's choir, all singing to the glory of God, do go, you will enjoy. President Kieschnick's sermon was very inspirational and got the convention off to a good start.

That evening the delegates dinner was held. All the delegates and spouses (my wife, Barbara, joined me at the Convention) sat down to a meal in one of the halls in the hotels. Again to be with so many fellow Lutherans is quite an experience.

It was a very full week. We started promptly at 8AM each day, took a break for lunch, and then continued on until 6PM. Each morning started with a devotional service. Midmorning we had a Bible study. After lunch we had a devotional service and (of course) we always closed with a devotional service.

The theme for the Convention was "One People-Forgiven". It was highlighted all week long with Sermons and with short presentations, mostly by the District Presidents.

Sunday and Monday were mostly spent working on proposals from floor committees. These proposals included some restructuring of the Synod's inner workings. Also included in these first days were the President's report and the usual welcoming by locals.

On Tuesday the elections started. Rev. Matthew Harrison was elected as President, replacing Rev. Gerald Kieschnick. Dr Kieschnick had been President for three terms. This was followed by the elections for the five Vice Presidents positions.

The rest of the convention was a mixture of elections, working on the proposals from floor committees, special reports, and presentations by different people.

It was not a good year to be an incumbent, many incumbents were not re-elected. The week was busy, and at times got heated. (Yes, Lutherans do not always agree.)

The next couple of years should be interesting. There will be a new President and three new Vice-presidents. Many other elected positions will also have new people. With the structural changes enacted by the Convention, this term will be a real challenge for the new leadership.

Please continue to pray for the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod and its leaders!



# Smart


September is an exciting time, as you begin growing in wisdom with a new year of school and Sunday school. Be a "smart cookie" by making this special container for your kitchen. Change the pictures as your year goes by. Or fill the container with cookies to give as a gift.

#### What you need:

- 2 identical disposable plastic containers (rectangular and clear)
- Î lid
- 4 photos or drawings
- Scissors
- Sticky bow or ribbon (optional)
- Cookies

#### What you do:

- 1. Cut four different pictures or drawings to fit the sides of your container. Allow the edges to slightly overlap around the four sides of one container.
- 2. Gently set one container inside the other. Then slide the pictures or drawings down between the two containers to cover the four sides. Press the inner container down to secure the pictures in place between the sides.
- 3. Fill the container with cookies, and put the lid on top of the inner container.
- 4. You can put a sticky bow or ribbon on the lid to make the container look like a present.

#### The beginnings of Sunday school

Englishman Robert Raikes, born in 1735, was a Christian layman who was pained to see unschooled children working six days a week in factories or mines. On Sundays, children roamed the streets, often getting into trouble. Most didn't know how to read or write and knew nothing about Christ or the church.

As Raikes labored to reform England's prison system, he noticed that many children were imprisoned, stirring him to action on their behalf. He arranged for halls and homes to be used for educational purposes on Sundays, the one day children didn't have to work. He found volunteers to teach reading, writing and math, as well as the Bible and Christian beliefs.

The first Sunday school class was held in July 1780. Amazingly, by 1788 some 250,000 children were attending such schools. This occurred despite some people's opposition to the education of lower-class children.

Countless boys and girls have attended Sunday school classes since then, thanks to Raikes, who brought Christ's light and love to children around the world.


