THE GIFT OF CHRISTMAS

It was a simple story, written by a woman who shared something that happened one Christmas season when her family stopped at a little restaurant miles from home. She wrote:

"I sat Erik in a highchair and noticed everyone was quietly eating and talking. Suddenly Erik squealed with glee and said, 'Hi there.' He pounded his fat baby hands on the highchair tray. His eyes were wide with excitement and his mouth was bared in a toothless grin. He wriggled and giggled with merriment.

"I looked around and saw the source of his merriment. It was a man with a tattered rag of a coat, dirty, greasy and worn. His pants were baggy with zipper at half-mast and his toes poked out of would-be shoes. His shirt was dirty and his hair was uncombed and unwashed. His whiskers were too short to be called a beard and his nose was so varicose. it looked like a road map.

"We were too far from him to smell, but I was sure he smelled. His hands waved and flapped on loose wrists. Hi there, baby; hi there, big boy. I see ye, buster, the man said to Erik.

"My husband and I exchanged looks, 'What do we do?' Erik continued to laugh and answer, 'Hi, hi there.' Everyone in the restaurant noticed and looked at us and then at the man. The old geezer was creating a nuisance with my beautiful baby.

"Our meal came and the man began shouting from across the room, 'Do ya know patty cake? Do you know peek-a-boo? Hey, look, he knows peek-a-boo.' Nobody thought the Continued on next page old man was cute. He was obviously drunk. My husband and I were embarrassed. We ate in silence, all except Erik, who was running through his repertoire for the admiring skid-row burn, who in turn, reciprocated with his cute comments.

"We finally got through the meal and headed for the door. My husband went to pay the check and told me to meet him in the parking lot. The old man sat poised between me and the door. 'Lord, just let me out of here before he speaks to me or Erik,' I prayed.

"As I drew closer to the man, I turned my back trying to sidestep him and avoid any air he might be breathing. As I did, Erik leaned over my arm, reaching with both arms in a baby's 'pick-me-up' position. Before I could stop him, Erik had propelled himself from my arms to the man's.

"Suddenly a very old smelly man and a very young baby consummated their love relationship. Erik in an act of total trust, love and submission laid his tiny head on the man's ragged shoulder. The man's eyes closed and I saw tears hover beneath his lashes. His aged hands--full of grime, pain and hard labor--gently, so gently cradled my baby's bottom and stroked his back.

"No two beings have ever loved so deeply for so short a time. I stood awestruck. The old man rocked and cradled Erik in his arms for a moment and then his eyes opened and set squarely on mine. He said in a firm commanding voice, 'You take care of this baby.'

"Somehow I managed, 'I will,' from a throat that contained a stone. He pried Erik from his chest-unwillingly, longingly, as though he were in pain. I received my baby and the man said, 'God bless you, ma'am, you've given me my Christmas gift.'

"I said nothing more than a muttered thanks. With Erik in my arms, I ran for the car. My husband was wondering why I was crying and holding Erik so tightly, and why I was saying 'My God, my God, forgive me.'

"I had just witnessed Christ's love shown through the innocence of a tiny child who saw no sin and made no judgment. We were a child who saw a soul and a mother who saw a suit of clothes. I was a Christian who was blind, holding a child who was not. I felt it was God asking, 'Are you willing to share your son for a moment?' when He shared His for all eternity."

The Hostess Schedule through June 2011 was distributed. Hostesses for May 10, 2011 are still needed.



One of the first actions taken by the Haven's founding Board of Trustees at their inaugural meeting was to establish the Christmas Seal program. "Duly moved

and seconded that the LUTHERAN HAVEN conduct a Christmas Seals Campaign this year as introduced and recommended by Pastor Stephen M. Tuhy for the benefit of the Haven. Motion carried" January 24, 1946.

The Haven's forefathers looked to the proceeds from the Christmas Seal program to help fund charity care. And that hasn't changed!

God's work through the ministry of the Haven could not have taken place without those who have supported those in need. In today's difficult economic times, the support for the Christmas Seals will be a blessing to those whose funds have

not been able to sustain their long term care needs. Even with the help of Medicaid, we continue to be dependent on gifts from our friends.

This past year, Lutheran Haven provided \$347,580 in charity care. Our prayer goes with the 21,000 Seals that have been mailed to Haven friends and SELC District congregations that God would move people to respond in a generous way.

Celebrate the joy of Christmas — and remember Jesus' birth — by making this craft to decorate your home or to give as a gift.


What you need:

- 3 terra cotta pots (any size)
- Acrylic paints (including one for skin color)
- Paintbrush
- Craft glue (or a glue gun, with an adult to help)
- Brown yarn
- · Material swatches
- · Straw-colored raffia

What you do:

- 1. Decide which pot will be Joseph, Mary and baby Jesus. Turn each pot upside-down and paint a face on each one.
- 2. Decorate the pots by painting hair and clothes or by using yarn and material as hair and head coverings.
- 3. For baby Jesus, glue raffia along the bottom to look like straw in a manger.

"O Little Town of Bethlehem"

In 1865, a young American preacher named Phillips Brooks spent time in and around the fields of Bethlehem. On Christmas Eve, he attended worship in the Church of the Nativity, located on the site where tradition says Jesus was born.

Brooks was so spiritually touched by the experience that he later wrote a hymn for children to sing on Christmas Eve in his Philadelphia church. Lewis Redner, the church organist and Sunday school superintendent, composed the music for the beloved hymn, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Today it appears in most denominational hymnals. Brooks, a giant of a man physically (6'6" tall), was known throughout America as an eloquent and dominant force in the pulpit.

There is a large statue of the gifted man of God in front of Boston's famous Trinity Church, where Brooks last served. His death in 1893 was a major event in Boston. Upon learning of his passing, a 5-year-old girl exclaimed, "Oh, Mama, how happy the angels will be."

In 1943, German pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer was in prison because he opposed Adolph Hitler's demonic actions. Bonhoeffer knew he would soon be executed. It was a time of loneliness and dreadful anticipation.

While writing a letter to an old friend during Advent, Bonhoeffer remembered this hymn verse:

The manger glows bright and clear, The very night gives out a light, Darkness must not here appear, But faith remain both sure and bright.

The brave Bonhoeffer knew that no matter how dark and challenging a Christian's circumstances may be, we can celebrate joyously because the Lord has come. As he was led away to be hanged, Bonhoeffer said, "This is the end — for me the beginning of life."
