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REMEMBERING BAPTISM

It's rather creepy to think about it. But in Daejeon, South Korea, a fellow by the name of Jung Joon puts people into wooden coffins and pounds the lid shut. What is unusual is that Joon is not a funeral director. The people in the coffin aren't dead. He leads seminars. He begins his seminars with the words, "Okay, let's get close to death."

He explains it in this way, "It's a way to let go of certain things. Afterward you feel refreshed. You're ready to start your life all over again, this time with a clean slate."

The seminar begins with participants writing their goodbyes to family and friends. It includes the writing of one's own epitaph. They attend their own funeral and then climb into a coffin for an excruciating time of darkness and contemplation.

The image that he wants to convey is that real life is better than death. But, the message could be that the experience creates horrific nightmares without beneficial results.

Our Savior, Jesus, did not play dead. He died and in dying defeated death. He has come from death into a resurrection of life. He has come forth with new life and with new life for us.

We don't have to crawl into a coffin to experience a fake death.. We've already experienced death and resurrection to life in baptism.

That's what the apostle Paul says: (Romans 6:3-5) Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. If we have been united with him like this in his death, we will certainly also be united with him in his resurrection.

We don't need a coffin. We don't need to crawl into one. All we need is a baptismal font to remind us that there we died with Christ. There we were given new life. We will experience life fully in our resurrection from the dead on the Last Day,.

A blessed Easter, baptized ones, in the Name of the Resurrected One..

Coins

The Bible often uses coins to symbolize human greed. During Holy Week, 30 silver coins.— usually shown with a bag or purse.— represent Jesus' betrayal by his disciple Judas (Matthew 26:14-16). Many of Jesus' teachings are about money, including the parable of the lost coin. Coins also symbolize giving as an act of worship, just as the widow offered her last "mite" (Mark 12:41-44).

Although we may be battered and bruised, stumbling, limping or crawling, we shouldn't wallow in defeat. Instead, we can be confident in the victory Jesus won for us. We can shout with Paul, "Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:57, NRSV).

While you look back to Friday and look forward to Sunday, live victoriously in Saturday. Jesus has won and has run the victory lap ... and he's coming around again.

The Mariner's Memorial, a 75-foot brick tower, stands in the harbor of Gothenburg, Sweden, honoring Swedish, sailors who never returned. Atop it is the statue of a woman looking longingly toward the sea. She represents families who awaited their loved ones and recall their loss.

Jürgen Moltmann had a secular upbringing in Germany. In 1944, he was drafted into Hitler's army and sent into battle. After American soldiers captured Moltmann, a chaplain gave him a small Bible containing the New Testament and the Psalms.

Jesus walked off the pages and into the young man's heart. "I didn't find Christ," Moltmann said. "He found me." The gospel was such life-giving good news that when the war ended, Moltmann became a Christian theologian, teaching in both German and American seminaries.


Sharron Schademann presented her Treasurer's Report.

HOT CROSS BUNS

Make this traditional Easter recipe to remember how Christ gave his life for you.

What you need:

- 1 can (12 oz.) evaporated milk
- 1 stick (½ cup) butter, melted
- ½ cup sugar
- · Pinch of salt
- 1½ Tablespoons yeast
- 1 egg, beaten
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 5 cups flour
- Icing
- · An adult to help

What you do:

- 1. In large bowl, combine the first eight ingredients.
- 2. Stir in flour, one cup at a time, to form soft dough.

 Knead on a floured surface until smooth and elastic (about five minutes).
- 3. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled (about one hour).
- 4. Knead out air bubbles. Form six two-inch balls.
- 5. Place two inches apart on a greased cookie sheet. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 30 minutes).
- 6. Bake at 375 degrees until golden (13 to 15 minutes). Cool on wire racks.
- 7. Add icing in a cross shape. Enjoy!

Greetings from Chiang Mai, Thailand! I hope this finds you well...and seeing some signs of Spring there!

We have really appreciated the faithful prayer and financial support we have received from Zion. Thank you for all you have done to be an ambassador for our work with LBT here in Southeast Asia.

You may have already received our recent newsletter that talks about our furlough coming up this summer. We would love to visit you and the members of Zion while we are stateside to share an update in person about the work here. We are going to be spending time at the LBT office in Aurora during the third week of August (and also possibly helping Ellyn settle into a college in the Chicago area during that week), and we are wondering if it would work with your schedule to visit Zion on Sunday August 21st. We are happy to share in adult Bible class, Sunday school and/or during the worship. I am not a pastor, though I am happy to share a mission message if that would be appropriate. How would this date work for you?

I am also writing to share a need we have related to our furlough. We are looking for a vehicle to use for about 6 weeks or so that we will be traveling in the midwest. We will be arriving in Chicago on July 6th and we will be leaving on August 23th. During those weeks we will be spending time primarily in Indiana and then making a trip up to Michigan/Wisconsin to visit a number of supporters there. I know it is somewhat unlikely that people have an extra car...but we are just putting out feelers with our supporters in the mid-west to see if anyone might be able to assist in this way.

We look forward to being in touch! We appreciate your prayers for our continued preparation for furlough. Next week I am traveling out of town to lead a training for several Christian leaders from Myanmar, and we appreciate your prayers for that time as well.
